## Northwest Indiana Labor Market **Highlights**

Latest market data figures were released by the Department of Workforce Development for August 2020 and reflect changes since June 2020.




Labor Force decreased by 3,248

The latest data for Northwest Indiana (August 2020) shows employment in Northwest Indiana making strides toward recovering from the effects of shelter in place policies and COVID-19. Overall employment in the region grew by 5,471, or 1.5% from the previous month. Compared to the previous year, however, employment remains down 5.1%. The unemployment rate in the region improved significantly as well, dropping by 2.1% from July and sits at 8.5% for August. While Northwest Indiana's rate remains higher than the state rate, the region's rate matches that of the nation.

While government employment driven by the return to school for educators fueled part of this increase, total private employment did rise 1.2% from the previous month. While employment remains 7% below August 2019, this new report suggests improvement. Service providing industries accounted for much of the growth, rising by 2.6%. Goods producing industries also improved though, with employment rising .8%. Despite these increases, employment in specific industries continue to remain anywhere from 2% to 8% below the previous year.

While education employment led the charge, rising by 27%, all other industries with the exception of manufacturing saw employment rise. Other leaders include Construction (3.8%), Professional Services (3.1%), Healthcare (1.8%), and retail (.9%). Manufacturing (-0.2%) was the only industry to see a decline in employment. All of these numbers will be important to watch as we enter into the fall and winter seasons.
