## Northwest Indiana Labor WORKFORCE Market **Highlights**

Latest market data figures were released by the Department of Workforce Development for October 2020 and reflect changes since August 2020.



The latest data for Northwest Indiana (October 2020) shows a continued decline in the unemployment rate in Northwest Indiana. The region's rate of 6.2% in October represents a 1.5% decline from the previous month. At the same time, however, the region's labor force has experienced a continued slide since a high in June, declining by more than 20,000, or 4.9%, over that span. This seems to suggest that some of the its unemployment improvement may be as a result of benefits expiring for displaced workers. One promising note, employment in the region has been improving each moth over the span of the pandemic, and that continued in October. The region's employed population (377,742) is the highest it has been since February. Despite this increase, though, employment still remains 3.7% below the same month last year.

Employment improved across nearly all industries over the past month, pointing a continued recovery across the economy. Total private employment rose 1.3% from the previous month, and the decline from the previous year dipped below 5% for the first time since the start of the pandemic (-4.8%). This improvement was achieved by gains in service-providing industries (.7%) as well as goods producing industries (2.1%). The industries to see the largest gains from the previous month were Construction (5.9%), Professional Services (2.6%), and Retail (2%).

While seeing improvements, employment remains down, both overall and across all industries compared to the previous year. Those facing the most serious declines include: Education (-8.6%), Leisure and Hospitality (-6.6%); Construction (-6.1), and Healthcare (-5.7%). While all other industries have declines from the previous year, they have lower declines than overall employment.
