

## Northwest Indiana Labor Market **Highlights**

Latest market data figures were released by the Department of Workforce Development for December 2020 and reflect changes since October 2020.





The latest data for Northwest Indiana (December 2020) shows a continued improvement in employment and labor force. The region's unemployment rate dropped to 5.7% in December, the lowest rate since the first quarter of 2020. We reached this low rate due to a decrease in unemployment as well as an increase in both labor force and employment in the region. While the labor force estimate has been volatile month to month throughout the year, it ended the year near the same mark as 2019, down less than half a percent (-0.4%) compared to December 2019.

Changes in employment across industries the region was overall relatively unchanged, but this masks larger changes within individual industries. Total private employment saw essentially no change from the previous month (-0.3%), and remains down 4.3% from December 2019. Good producing industries, which represent 20% of regional employment, declined 1.6% from November. However, seasonal changes in construction employment mostly drove this change, as the industry dropped 5.6% from the previous month.

Other industries experiencing declines in December include Professional Services (-1.1%) and Leisure and Hospitality (-2.2%). The industries facing the largest declines from the previous year include Healthcare and Social Assistance (-8.1%), Education (-8.0%), and Leisure and Hospitality (-6.3%).

The retail industry experienced the largest increase from the previous month. This increase (3.3%) is largely spurred by seasonal hiring to meet shopper demand during the holidays; though it was enough to make employment in the industry higher than the economy overall, as Retail closed the year down 3.6% from December 2019, compared to -4.3% for employment overall. The moves of this industry will be important to watch, and will be a large determinant of January's unemployment changes.
